History

Indigenous Acknowledgement

Fremantle Foundation wishes to acknowledge the Aboriginal people of the many traditional lands and language groups of Western Australia. We acknowledge the wisdom of Aboriginal Elders both past and present and pay respect to Aboriginal communities of today.

Our history

The idea of establishing a Community Foundation in Fremantle was first considered in 2010. Founder Dylan Smith, along with a dedicated group of community leaders felt that there could be support in Fremantle to develop a community foundation with a permanent capital base, which if invested well, had the opportunity to grow in perpetuity.

A portion of the annual income could then be used to make charitable grants. It was felt that a fund would be of great benefit to the Fremantle and broader Western Australian community.

The foundation was publicly launched in December 2010 and a number of those on that initial Committee became founding Directors.

Since those early years, the Foundation has had long-term support from a number of prominent local families and businesses, who have continued to support the foundation since its inception, with their time and generosity.

Since 2010, the Foundation has grown and now manages over 71 donor funds.

Community foundations have existed for more than a hundred years by adhering to a simple proposition: they exist to serve their local communities. In this time of ongoing uncertainty, community philanthropy has never been more valuable.

As such, it has been extremely heartening to see our donor community at Fremantle Foundation respond with new levels of generosity which has seen a record \$1.01 million in grants distributed into the WA community.

This year the philanthropy community celebrated long-sought-after DGR reforms that will give community foundations greater scope to simplify their work, enabling faster responses, greater impact and the ability to receive funds from private foundations ultimately driving more impact in local communities.

At board level, we farewelled Heiko Plange-Korndoerfer, and thank him for his contribution. We are delighted to welcome new Board members, Joanne McDonald, Sandra Di Bartolomeo and Carina Becker who collectively bring extensive professional services, governance and community investment experience.

My thanks to my fellow directors, and the Fremantle Foundation team for their dedication.

As we look ahead to Fremantle Foundation's 12th anniversary in 2022, I am confident that we will continue to be the lead advocate for localised philanthropy in WA and drive community-based impact.

Executive Officer's Report

As communities across Western Australia continued to struggle with the ongoing impacts of the pandemic and natural disasters it was clear there was elevated importance placed on the Fremantle Foundation to help support our community during a time of heightened need.

Drawing on the positives of this adversity, we saw a greater inclination for the community to pull together to overcome the challenges presented and donate a record amount of \$1.4 million into Donor Named Funds held with the foundation.

Our benchmark for this heightened willingness to help others is reflected in our donors' generosity to the Foundation.

Never before have so many of our donors and partners dug so deep to support the work that we do in the community. Thank you, you have been extraordinary with your support.

Due to the generosity of our donors in 2021/22 we distributed \$1.01 million to 63 organisations throughout Western Australia and interstate including \$300,000 in crisis response funding, providing a lifeline to community-based organisations on the frontline struggling to respond to the 2021 Wooroloo bushfires, the devastation of cyclone Seroja and COVID-19.

During its 10th year, the Fremantle Foundation's flagship collective giving vehicle, Impact100 Fremantle celebrated raising over \$1 million to support over 40 Fremantle based not-for-profit charities.

Other milestones include the launch of the WA Relief & Recovery Fund, and our crisis relief partnership with the Paul Ramsay Foundation.

As we continue to grow, we are using our experience to support future philanthropists and collective giving groups to give back to the WA community.

This year the Fremantle Foundation team was delighted to introduce a new and improved granting system and an online portal for granting opportunities. The new system streamlines the grant agreement and reporting process for our grant partners, reducing the administrative burden and allowing them to focus on their important work of impact.

This year saw the Fremantle Foundations portfolio responsibly invest its corpus. By investing 100% of the corpus responsibly, Fremantle Foundation donors are able to double their impact. The flow on effect of our investment performance and your extra donations means we can provide more and/or larger grants to community projects in the future.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed and supported Fremantle Foundation this year, particularly our Board, fundholders, donors, Impact100 committee, corporate partners and our incredible Fremantle Foundation team.

Group Named Funds

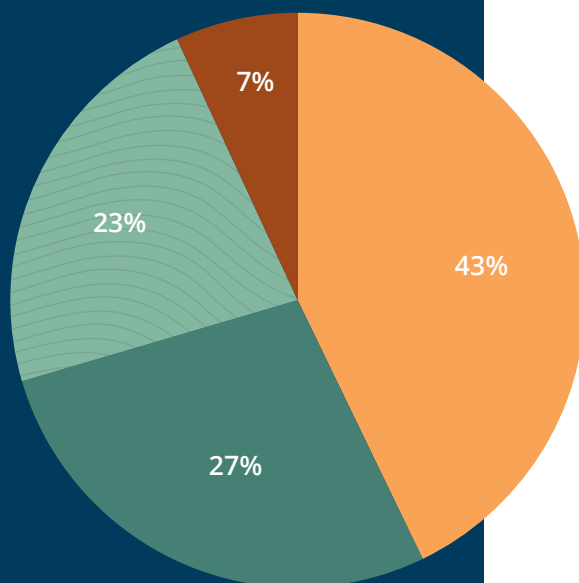

Grants

In 2021/22 the Foundation distributed 75 grants valued at over \$1 million.

Our community has an incredible depth and diversity of organisations that are here to help and provide support to people in our community.

Evaluation of the applications is a humbling experience as they not only provide an understanding of the complexity of need but also the resourcefulness that many organisations implement to provide help.

Our grant applications undergo strict reviews, require accountability and need to align with our priorities. These priorities are determined by our research and engagement with the community, establishing areas of need. We also take into account the areas of interest as expressed by our donors.

We have a year-round open grant round with the grants distributed being directed by our donors, in conjunction with the Foundation team.

The Foundation takes approximately four weeks to review and process the grants which includes conducting due diligence and assessment of each application against a set of criteria.

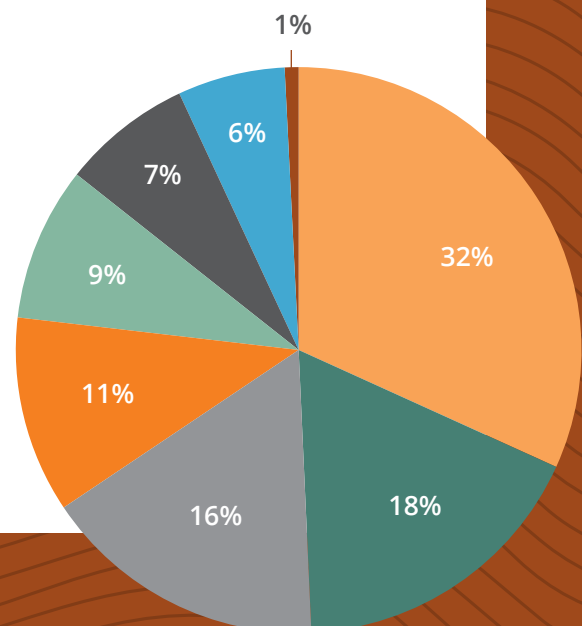
The criteria includes identification of need, review of intended impact and how the measurement of outcomes will be undertaken.

Grant applications far exceed our allocations budget, but as our Foundation continues to grow we hope to meet more needs.

Our grants program is made possible through our growing corpus thanks to generous donations and gifts in wills to the Foundations.

Solidifying family support

Family & Community – Eureka Fund

One of many organisations supported by the Eureka Fund included funding for the Annual Children’s Camp run by Starick.

This annual camp is for women and children impacted by family and domestic violence who are accommodated in Starick’s refuges and transitional housing program. It provides a much-needed opportunity for families to connect with each other, experience the natural environment, relax, and have fun in a safe and supportive environment. For many families, it is their first family holiday and experience outside the metropolitan area.

Through their generous donations, the Duffield-Thomas family have made a difference for Climate Action Network Australia (CANA). CANA strives for a sustainable Australia, free of pollution, where people and nature are protected from dangerous climate change. The Duffield-Thomas family helped fund the National Climate Action Retreat and Conference, where representatives from CANA had the opportunity to engage with parliamentarians and call for climate action at a grassroots level.

Empowering the vulnerable

Homelessness – Impact100 Fremantle

Homeless Healthcare is a not-for-profit organisation that recognises the growing need for medical outreach for those affected by homelessness in the Fremantle area.

Their street health engagement operates through a team consisting of a nurse and a caseworker employed by HHC. The team goes out on foot to see people on the streets and footpaths of inner-city Fremantle.

The grant from Impact100 Fremantle has helped Homeless Healthcare increase their outreach by an extra day, pay for medical supplies and equipment and increase their overall impact around the Fremantle area.

Arts & Culture – WA Relief & Recovery Fund

DADAA is a not-for-profit community art and cultural development organisation focusing on creating positive social change and opportunities for people with a disability or a mental illness.

Granting from the WA Relief & Recovery Fund supported DADAA's Digital Diversity Project aimed at addressing digital disadvantage in Midland and introducing new opportunities for creativity and self-expression for people with disabilities through digital technology.

Challenging times call for community spirit

WA Relief & Recovery Fund: COVID-19

At the beginning of the pandemic, individuals, families, and the community were met with unprecedented challenges. Fremantle Foundation received \$500,000 worth of requests for financial assistance from local not-for-profits. For this, the WA Relief and Recovery Fund: COVID-19 was established.

The Paul Ramsay Foundation along with individuals, businesses and families in our community made generous donations towards this initiative and a collective fund of \$318,200 was eventually raised for the initial granting round in 2020. Later, in 2022, the Paul Ramsay Foundation partnered with Fremantle Foundation again, making a major donation of \$300,000 for a second round of grant distributions.

Due to these spectacular efforts of the community and generosity of the Paul Ramsay Foundation, the WA Relief and Recovery Fund: COVID-19 has directed financial support to food and housing, social support, and health services for people faced with adversity. This included Indigenous Australians, low-income families, seniors, those have faced increased struggles because of reduced or lost income and those experiencing homelessness.

Some ways the WA Relief and Recovery Fund has made a difference during difficult times:

DADAA Midland appointed a researcher who has conducted the first consultation session with Midland Hub Team.

Mabu Mayi Café & Liyan-ngan Nyirrwa were able to continue their social enterprise, Indigenous training program and the employment of their trainee chef.

Dress For Success Perth have recruited a career support coordinator.

Southern Aboriginal Corporation transported 200 foodbank hampers to Narrogin, 160 hampers to Katanning and were able to conduct a Christmas event for the Noongar families there.

Barking Gecko Theatre provided 415 students from disadvantaged schools with access to creative experiences that supported their academic, social and emotional wellbeing during the pandemic.

FremantleMind Inc. expanded the Fremantle Alliance Against Depression to the local government areas of Melville and Cockburn and formalised the alliance with Imagined Futures.

Impact100 Fremantle

Everyone should have the opportunity to create positive social change in their community. Impact100 Fremantle was established in 2012 to engage donors keen to support our community and experience first-hand the impact of collective giving.

The Impact100 Fremantle collective giving program is a powerful mechanism that pools the individual \$1,000 donations of a group of like-minded people that will make a lasting difference in the Fremantle region through an annual grant to a community organisation.

The recipient of the Impact100 Fremantle grant is decided by donor vote. Every donor who provides a \$1,000 contribution to the program is invited to the Annual Voting & Awards Night and hear the funding pitch from the four shortlisted organisations that have applied for the Impact100 Fremantle grant. The organisation with the most donor votes receives the game-changing grant.

Through this process, donors have a say about where their donation goes as well as being immersed in the work of four community organisations.

In 2021 Homeless Healthcare was the recipient of the major \$100,000 grant which has allowed them to increase the impact of their street health service in the Fremantle area.

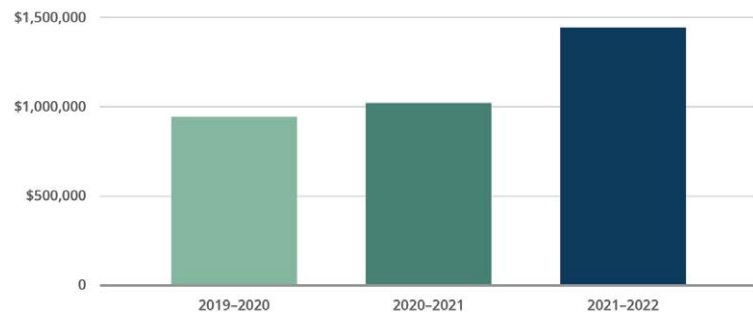

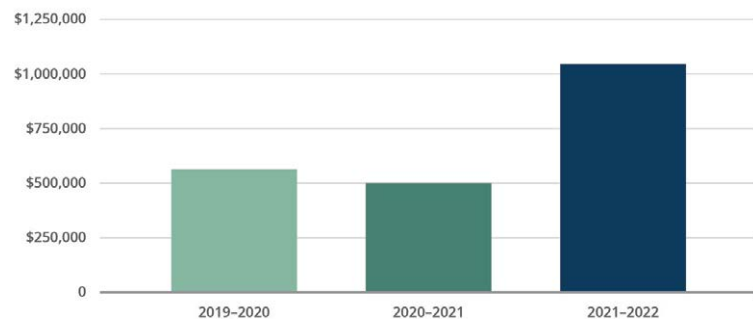

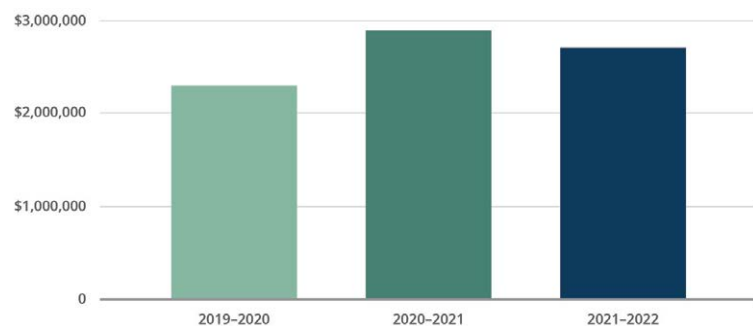
Total Donations
